Eight of the holes are par 3s and blind shots are the norm rather than the expection. This is seaside golf in its rawest, prettiest and most natural form.

The course is on common land, so don't be surprised to see sheep wandering the fairways. With views across the Bristol Channel a clear day here is a delight.



**7 9 ISLE OF PURBECK Dorset, England Designers:** Harry Colt **Green fee:** £44 **Tel:** 01929 450 361 IT is rare to find anywhere with views this special but the real glory of Isle of Purbeck is that they come on all four sides, whether looking to the Isle of Wight, across Poole harbour or towards the Purbeck Hills. This heathland course is set in a nature reserve, a par of 70 making it more testing than its modest yardage suggests.



**7 8 CROWBOROUGH BEACON Sussex, England Designers:** MacKenzie **Green fee:** £50 **Tel:** 01892 661 511 THIS is a pretty heathland course not unlike Royal Ashdown Forest. It is not especially long but does not need to be with small greens and sloping fairways. It gets fast and firm in the summer, when position is more important than power. Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of Sherlock Holmes, was club captain here 100 years ago.



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**BROADSTONE Dorset, England Designers:** Tom Dunn/Harry Colt **Green fee:** £58 **Tel:** 01202 692 595 CONSIDERING how close it is to the bustling centre of Broadstone, it is remarkable how quickly you find yourself on a heathland plain with little evidence of modern life. The best holes are undoubtedly in the middle section with the 7th rated the hardest hole – a matter there can be few arguments about.
